Temporary crosses will be replaced in due course by permanent headstones to be erected by the Imperial War Graves Commission. Details of the inscription on the temporary cross will be carefully checked at that stage and any errors rectified before the permanent headstone is erected.

Sir,

I am directed to refer to your letter of recent date addressed to the Accounts Branch which has been referred to this Department, and to inform you with regret that your brother, Sergeant Arthur Hatfield, Royal Air Force, was reported missing as the result of air operations on the night of the 25th/26th February, 1944, when the Lancaster aircraft in which he was flying as mid-upper gunner set out to bomb Augsburg and failed to return to its base.

Subsequent information received from France, through the United States Army authorities, stated that a four engined aircraft crashed and exploded that night at a place called Leuse, and that the remains of five of the crew were found. Among the personel effects were a watch and a lighter engraved with the name and service number of the Flight Engineer belonging to your brother's crew, and it was by this means that the identity of the aircraft was established.

Unhappily the circumstances of aircraft crashes are frequently such that it is impossible to identify individual members of the crew, or even to ascertain, with certainty, the number of occupants of the aircraft.

It can only be assumed that such tragic circumstances obtained when your brother's aircraft was brought down.

I am to explain that the identification and registration of the graves of those believed to have lost their lives in enemy territory is carried out by the Graves Registration and Enquiry Service of the War Office. Unhappily the magnitude of this task is such that a considerable time must elapse before all areas are covered and all investigations completed, but I am to assure you that if there is any news you will be notified.

In conclusion I am to express the professed sympathy of the Department with you in the great loss you have sustained.

I have now received a eport from the Royal Air Force Missing Research and Enquir Service regarding the recent excavation at the scene of the crash at Leuze. Owing to the assertion by Mrs. Stollar that two bodies had been left in the wreckage a crane to lift the engine and a large party of civilian labourers had to be obtained to complete this task, which has taken some time.

I am glad to say that bodies were found. But some tragments of bone and cloting, were discovered on the right and left sides of the craterhave been reverently reinterred in the grave at Liesse. The Maire, M. Scourbanier, was present throughout the excavation.

I have written to the Clatives of the other members of the crew.

I do sincerely hope the this information will set your mind at rest in this sad mater, and that you will now be quite sure that all that remains of this gallant crew will always rest together.
